## **General Meeting Resolutions**

There are four types of resolutions that might be passed at general meetings: ordinary, special, unopposed or unanimous.

For an owners corporation with one or two members, the requirements for passing an ordinary, special, unopposed or unanimous resolution at a general meeting are that no votes are cast against the resolution and at least one vote is cast in favour of the resolution.

An abstention for any unit does not in itself prevent an ordinary, special, unopposed or unanimous resolution from being passed, if at least one vote is cast in favour of the resolution.

If the owners corporation has two members, both must be present to make up a quorum for consideration of the resolution, unless either is not entitled to vote on the resolution.

For an owners corporations with more than two members, the table below applies.

A poll may be demanded on an ordinary or special resolution at a general meeting by anyone present and entitled to vote at the meeting. A poll may be taken in any way the chairperson considers appropriate (secret ballot, show of hands, etc). Such a demand for a poll may be withdrawn. The result of a poll must be declared at the meeting by the chairperson as soon as it is worked out and decides whether or not the resolution for which the poll was demanded has been carried (s. 3.29, Schedule 3, UTMA).
